Field of specialization: the history and politics of Iran.

Author of *Post-Revolutionary Politics in Iran: Religion, Society and Power* (2001); *Revolution at a Crossroads: Iran's Domestic Politics and Regional Ambitions* (1997), *Iran: Between Islam and the West* (1996, in Hebrew), *Education and the Making of Modern Iran* (1992), *Iran: A Decade of War and Revolution* (1990), and *Iran in Revolution* (1988, in Hebrew). Editor of *The Iranian Revolution and the Muslim World* (1990), *Central Asia Meets the Middle East* (1998), *Islamic Fundamentalism: A Challenge to Regional Stability* (1993, in Hebrew). Dr. Menashri has published numerous papers on Iranian politics.
