Director's Message

It's hard to believe that another year has flown by since my last message to you. I hope everyone has had another successful and productive year. As usual, we have been keeping very busy here at the Station and I'd like to give everyone an update on some of the activities that have been going on since last autumn.

One of the biggest events that we had at UOBS this year was the biennial Friends of the UOBS (FUOBS) reunion. Approximately 50 persons attended the weekend long event (22-24 July). Although attendance was down from the reunion two years ago, I think everyone had a great time. (For further info on the reunion see articles later in this issue).

As for other station news...we have had some staffing changes at the Station. Longtime Norman-based UOBS secretary, Susan Bayliss has left her 0.75 FTE position to take up a 1.0 FTE position in the OU College of Arts & Sciences Dean's office, effective 6 September 2005. We are currently searching for Susan's successor. I want to thank Susan for her 11 years of dedicated service to UOBS. The Texoma-based administrative secretary position (formerly held by Kelli Brown) has been filled with the recent hiring of Janet Isaac. Welcome aboard, Janet! Also, on 1 July 2005, Dr. Chad Hargrave (Ph.D. OU 2005) joined the scientific research staff at the Station as the first recipient of the rotating (2-3 year) resident postdoctoral fellow position. Chad is currently conducting experiments in collaboration with Dr. Dave Hambright and myself, which will examine the relative roles

of intraspecific (i.e. genetic) variation and interspecific variation on maintaining ecosystem functions using a model Daphnia/zooplankton/algal microcosm system at the station.

Other news includes Dr. Dave Hambright receiving a 2-year (\$269,349) grant from the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation (ODWC) entitled "Toxicological and Ecological Roe of Prymnesium parvumI in Lake Texoma (Lebanon Pool) in the late January / early February 2004, and caused a massive fish kill. This invasive species has subsequently spread to other parts of the lake. This award funds a resident postdoctoral researcher, Dr. Peter Unmack, and a M.S. student, Nicole Luke. Congratulations Dave!

Still further news...UOBS continues to host educational and professional conferences,. After a 1-year hiatus, we welcomed back the (Okla. State Regents for Higher Education-funded) "Multi-disciplinary Field Academy in Zoology and Botany" headed by Dr. Bruce Smith. We also hosted a large (~100 student) Upward Bound group from Tahlequah in late June, along with two very successful Summer Sessions (total enrollment in May and August was 139 students in 10 courses). This fall, UOBS hosted the 2nd. Meeting of the Oklahoma-Texas Aquatic Research Group (OTARG), held jointly with the Texas River & Reservoir Management Society, and we continue to host long-term conference groups such as the Southwestern Association of Parasitologists (SWAP) and Tri Beta. As you can see, UOBS has had a very busy year and we look forward to 2006. Best wishes to all!
