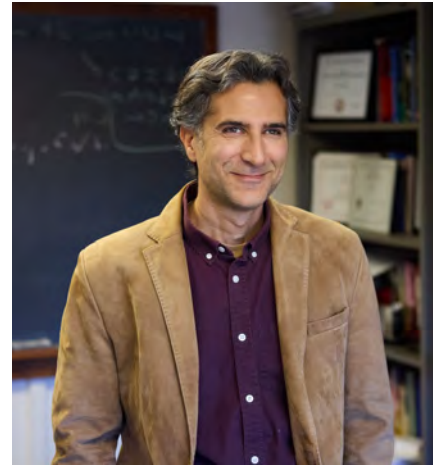
Report from the Chair

Welcome to the spring 2026 edition of our department newsletter. We are delighted to share a number of exciting updates, milestones, and achievements with you.

This spring, our Awards Banquet celebrated more than 40 students with scholarships and honors, with over \$28,000 awarded thanks to your continued support. Among the recognitions were the Alexander Kondonassis Award for Research in Development, the Chong Liew Summer Research Fellowship, outstanding first-year Ph.D. student awards, outstanding teaching assistant awards, and several major scholarships including the Joe W. Shary, William M. Clark, and Alexander B. Holmes Scholarships. It was a wonderful evening, made even more special by the presence of families, faculty, and peers celebrating our students' accomplishments.



We are also pleased to welcome a new colleague to the department. Dr. Minwoo Hyun joins us from the University of California, Santa Barbara, and brings expertise in energy and environmental economics. We look forward to the contributions he will make to both our research community and our students' learning experience.

Our recent Day of Giving was another highlight. Thanks to your generosity, we secured \$4,500 in seed donations along with an additional \$1,500 in OU Foundation challenge funds. We were especially proud to receive the award for the highest number of donations during the early morning hours—a testament to the strength and engagement of our alumni community. Your support directly expands the opportunities we can offer our students, and we are deeply grateful.

Our faculty continue to achieve remarkable success. Recent recognitions include Dr. Greg Burge being named a David Ross Boyd Professor, Dr. Pallab Ghosh receiving the Merrick Foundation Teaching Award, and Dr. Brent Norwood earning the John H. and Jane M. Patten Teaching Award. Dr. Jayash Paudel was selected as a Presidential Teaching Fellow in the Honors College. In addition, Dr. Greg Burge and Dr. Firat Demir each celebrated 20 years of service to the University. Based on recent RePEc rankings, Dr. Demir, Dr. Georgia Kosmopoulou, Dr. Jayash Paudel, and Dr. Tyler Ransom are all recognized among the top economists worldwide in their respective categories.

Our students also continue to excel. Courtney Shupert received the Distinguished Young Alumni Award, and Avery Dunlap was honored with the Carl Albert Award. Samuel “Sammy” Tompkins presented his research at the Yale Undergraduate Research Conference, and Zach Zaslavsky has been admitted as a predoctoral researcher at MIT Blueprint Labs, where he will work with the research team of Nobel prize winning economist, Dr. Daron Acemoglu.

Looking ahead, our undergraduate and graduate programs continue to grow in both size and strength. We are expanding our Ph.D. and online M.A. programs and are excited to launch an online B.A. in Economics in fall 2026. We will also have our Economics in London program this summer. Dr. Kosmopoulou and I will co-lead the program, offering courses in World Economic Development and the Economics of Art and Art Markets, while immersing students in the city.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the Department of Economics at the University of Oklahoma—a milestone that reflects a century of teaching, research, and service. We are pleased to recognize the outstanding achievements of our faculty, students, and alumni who received awards during the Spring semester. These honors reflect the excellence, dedication, and impact of our community across teaching, research, and service. We congratulate all of this year's award recipients for their well-deserved recognition.

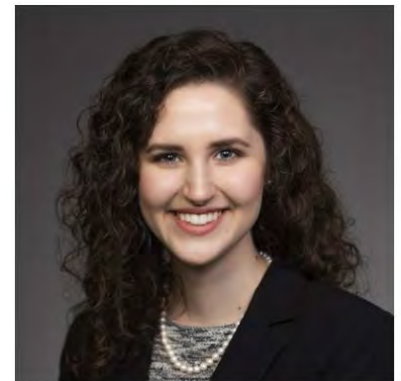
Dr. Greg Burge, Dr. B., won the **David Ross Boyd Professorship**. The David Ross Boyd Professorship is one of the University's highest honors, recognizing faculty who have consistently demonstrated outstanding teaching, guidance, and leadership for students in an academic discipline or in an interdisciplinary program within the University.

Dr. Pallab Ghosh won the **Merrick Foundation Teaching Award**. This award was established in 1976 by the Merrick Foundation of Ardmore to recognize the faculty member who is considered most outstanding in bringing to students a better understanding and appreciation of the economic and political basis of American society.

Dr. Brent Norwood won the **John H. and Jane M. Patten Teaching Award**. To win this award, the nominee must have made an outstanding contribution as a classroom instructor. The awardee should be a model teacher, recognized for dedication, effectiveness and the ability to inspire students to high levels of achievement. Outstanding teaching should be demonstrated through student-teacher evaluations, chair recommendations and additional information such as student or peer letters of support, sample syllabi, course materials, etc. While classroom instruction is the primary focus of the award, research, publications and public service is also be considered in the selection process.

Dr. Jayash Paudel won the **Presidential Teaching Fellowship in the Honors College**. This fellowship provides faculty from across campus with the opportunity to exclusively teach Honors undergraduate courses during their tenure. Faculty fellows receive stipends in recognition of their strong commitment to teaching and mentoring undergraduates and for supporting the development of innovative interdisciplinary classes that will further their pedagogy in years to come.

Courtney Shupert, an Economics Department graduate, received the **Distinguished Alumni Award** within the Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences. She currently serves as an Assistant Economist at the Oklahoma City Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, reflecting the continued excellence and impact of our alumni.



Avery Dunlap, a 2026 Economics Department graduate, received **Carl Albert Award**. Avery is the second Economics Department graduate to receive this prestigious award in two years, after **Julie Dawkins won it in 2024**. The Carl Albert Award, the most prestigious honor given to a student by the OU Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences, is based on academic performance, moral force of character and promise of future service to the state and nation. First presented in 1966, the award was established to honor Carl Albert, the late OU alumnus and U.S. Speaker of the House, for his distinguished undergraduate career and national service. Julian Rothbaum, former state regent and longtime friend of Albert, endowed the award in 1965.

In the November 2025 rankings, our colleague **Dr. Georgia Kosmopoulou** was recognized **among the top 10% of female economists worldwide**, according to RePEc (Research Papers in Economics), a leading database that ranks economists based on their research output and impact. This distinction highlights the global influence and quality of her scholarly contributions.



Her remarkable achievements are further underscored by her recent appointment as **Co-Editor of Economic Inquiry**, a highly respected journal in the field of economics. Dr. Georgia Kosmopoulou has received a **Fulbright Specialist Program award**. Dr. Kosmopoulou will complete a project at **Universidad Nacional de San Agustín de Arequipa in Peru** that aims to exchange knowledge and establish partnerships benefiting participants, institutions, and communities both in the U.S. and overseas through a variety of educational and training activities within Economics.

Jayash Paudel received a **grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture** for a two-year research initiative, separate from the previously reported NSF-funded project. As a co-Principal Investigator, he will evaluate the potential of no-tillage farming to conserve water and mitigate the negative effects of heat stress on winter wheat production in Oklahoma. The project's long-term objective is to develop tools for farmers, water managers, policymakers, and administrators to support informed decision-making on water resource allocation, and to contribute to policies that incentivize sustainable farming practices.



Awards 2025

Dr. Cynthia Rogers won the **2025 Board of Regents Award for Superior Professional and University Service and Public Outreach**. The University of Oklahoma Board of Regents Award for Superior Professional and University Service and Public Outreach recognizes faculty for significant contributions to the university, community, and profession. Dr. Cynthia Rogers, Professor of Economics, was recognized for her extensive public outreach, including economic policy work and community education initiatives.

Dr. Qihong Liu was named **President's Associates Second Century Presidential Professorship**

The Presidential Professorships were established to recognize those faculty members who excel in all of their professional activities and who relate those activities to the students they teach and mentor.

Dr. Firat Demir was named the **David L. Boren Professor**.

The David L. Boren Professorship is one of the University of Oklahoma's highest honors, recognizing faculty who have made truly exceptional contributions to the mission of a public research university. To qualify for the Professorship, a faculty member must have consistently demonstrated outstanding teaching, research and creative activity, and leadership in professional and public service. The holders of this distinctive honor should demonstrate effective mentoring and engagement of students in advancing knowledge creation and making a positive difference in the world.

Dr. Tyler Ransom was awarded **The Heritage Foundation's 2025 Freedom and Opportunity Academic Prize**. Dr. Ransom is among 14 distinguished scholars nationwide to receive this recognition. The Heritage Foundation's Freedom and Opportunity Academic Prizes recognize higher education professionals whose innovative work contributes to important policy discussions.

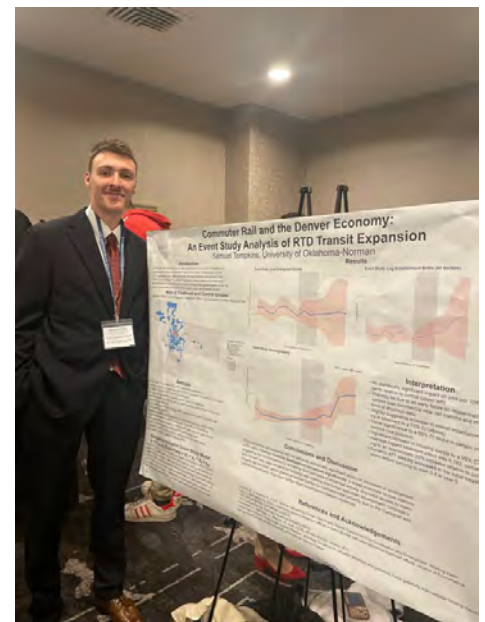
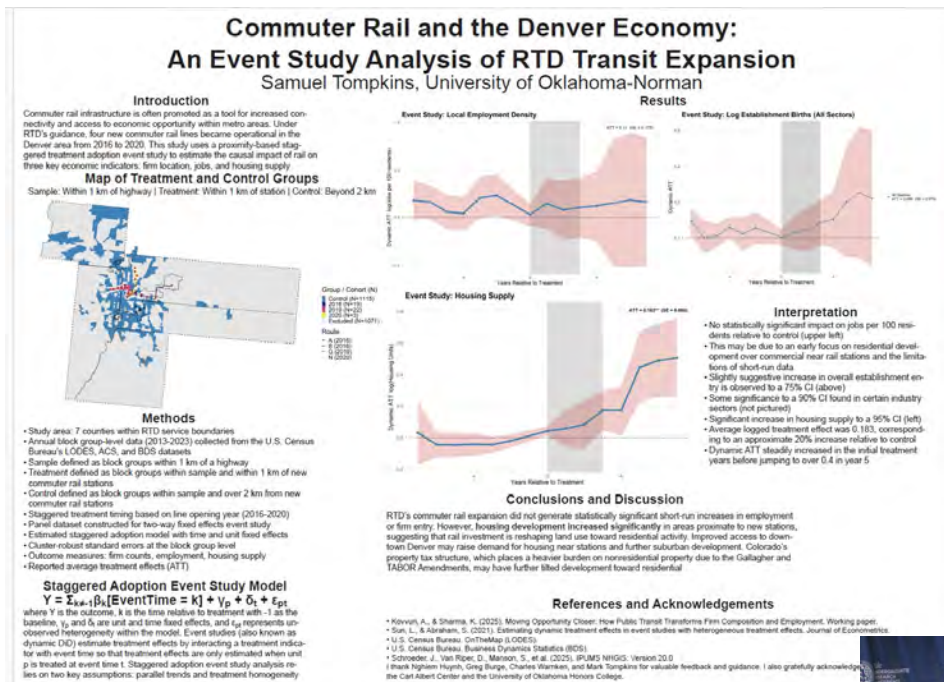
Minwoo Hyun has accepted an offer to join the department as an Assistant Professor, beginning in August 2026. He is currently a *Ph.D. candidate in Economics at the University of California, Santa Barbara*, and is expected to graduate in June 2026. His research focuses on energy and environmental economics, with particular interests in labor and public policy. His current work examines the economic challenges of the energy transition, including the reallocation of fossil fuel workers and the fiscal impacts on coal-dependent local governments.

Dr. Samantha Johnson received the **Norman Next Under 40 Award**. This marks the second consecutive year that a faculty member from the Department of Economics has earned this recognition in Norman, Oklahoma. Congratulations!

Samuel "Sammy" Tompkins, an undergraduate economics major advised by Dr. Nghiem Huynh, recently presented his research at the Yale Undergraduate Research Conference (YURC) in February 2026. YURC is the nation's largest and most prestigious student-run undergraduate research conference, held annually at Yale University.

Sammy presented a poster titled "Commuter Rail and the Denver Economy: An Event Study Analysis of RTD Transit Expansion." His research uses a staggered adoption event study design to estimate the causal impact of Denver's commuter rail expansion on firm entry, employment, and housing supply. His attendance was supported by the OU Honors College.





Zach Zaslavsky

I'm Zach Zaslavsky, currently a **predoctoral researcher at MIT Blueprint Labs**, where I work with Professors Daron Acemoglu, David Autor, and Simon Johnson. I graduated from OU in Spring 2024 with a B.B.A., double majoring in Economics and International Business.

After OU, I pursued a master's degree in International Economics at the Barcelona School of Economics, where I had the honor of giving the commencement speech at our graduation. In the winter of 2025, I was a research assistant at CUNEF Universidad in Madrid before beginning my current role at MIT.

My time at OU was a great experience and prepared me well for both my master's program and my work as a research assistant. Intermediate Macroeconomics with Dr. Demir sparked my interest in economics, while a later course in Econometric Analysis with Dr. Liu gave me an important foundation for research. In addition to the classes I took, working again with Dr. Demir on my Honors Thesis was an invaluable step in my journey toward research.

Beyond economics, I completed a minor in German and was involved in the German Club and study abroad programs, which inspired me to pursue graduate study in Europe. Outside of academics, spending Saturdays at football games remains one of my best memories at OU. I still watch every OU football game I can, even when I was living abroad with a seven-hour time difference.

If you are an OU student interested in continuing in academia—whether through a master’s program, a research assistantship, or eventually a PhD—I would recommend speaking with the professors of your favorite classes and exploring ways to get more involved. OU offers many opportunities, but it does require initiative to seek them out. I would also recommend trying different things and discovering what you enjoy. While at OU, I took courses across a wide range of topics, from sociology classes in the Honors College to International Financial Management in Price to Sports Economics, which gave me a broad experience and confidence in my decision to pursue a research career.

I am still early in my career, but I know I would like to continue in research. After the predoctoral program, I plan to pursue a PhD in Economics or a related field such as Public Policy or Finance. Whatever my next steps may be, I know my experience at OU will continue to stay with me.
