Connect is required to complete the homework assignments. You can either buy this at the OU Bookstore or through Canvas (the link to McGraw-Hill and assignments will provide you an

option to purchase. Buying directly from McGraw-Hill is a little cheaper, but otherwise, they are identical). If you cannot afford the textbook, you can get a free two-week trial to get started. If you still are unable to afford the textbook after the trial, please talk to me after class, and we can try to work something out.

Overview and Learning Objectives:

The objective of this course is to introduce students to basic microeconomic concepts and prepare them for future economic classes. By the end of this class, students should be able to:

- Understand microeconomic theory and its applications.
- Prepare and understand basic equilibrium graphs.
- Relate economic topics to real world situations.
- Explain economic principles.

Assignment Breakdown:

Grading for this class will consist of graded homework assignments (through Connect) and exams.

SmartBooks:

There will be two types of homework in this class. Before we start a unit, you will be assigned a SmartBook assignment. This is a very low stakes assignment to get you introduced to the material. There will be 14 of these assignments throughout the semester (one for each chapter). This is a participation grade, so you will have unlimited attempts for each assignment). Each assignment will be due by midnight of their assigned date. I will drop the lowest two grades, so you do not have to complete every assignment. *Since I drop two assignments, I will not accept any late work or reopen any assignments.* If you have any issues with the website, contact support through http://mhhe.com/supportLinks to an external site. or 1-800-331-5094.

Graded Homework:

The second type of homework is a graded assignment. This will be a more in-depth assignment going over the material from class. These assignments may include interactive graphs, calculations, or other multiple choice type questions. There will be 6 of these homework assignments (2 per unit). Unlike the SmartBooks, you will only have 2 attempts, and your highest score is what will go into the gradebook. These assignments will also be due at midnight on their assigned date. Since these assignments will be open for so long, *I will not accept any late work or reopen any assignments*.

Once an assignment has closed, you can go back and practice any section again without impacting your score (you can access the recharge assignments by clicking the McGraw-Hill Connect tab on the left then "Go to my Connect Section"). I've also posted videos from the authors going over the topics we talk about in class. These are not graded but are a great resource if you need a little more explanation on anything.

Exams:

There will be four exams throughout the semester, but I will drop the lowest exam. These multiple-choice exams will be taken *in-person* and will be closed book/note. On exam days, you will only be allowed to have your ID, calculator (with no back), and a writing utensil (pen or pencil). No cell phones, smart watches, earbuds, computers, tablets, etc. will be allowed. Please make sure to leave your backpack at home/in your car or you will have to leave them on stage during the exam.

For the exam, there will be three versions of the exam each with their own color. You and your neighbor should not have the same color. If you have the same color as someone next to you, you need to ask for a different version/color or you may be asked to move or start over on a new exam once we see it. When you turn in your exam, you must show your student ID (only a physical ID will work. You cannot use the one on your phone). If you do not have your ID, your exam may not be counted.

Since I drop the lowest exam score, exams *cannot be made up* except for very specific circumstances from the OU handbook including university events (athletic or Provost approved events), military service, or jury duty – in these cases, *I must be told at least 2 class periods in advance and correct documentation is required.*

The final for this class has been scheduled for Wednesday, December 17th from 8-10am in Dale 200. This will follow the same format as previous exams, but it will be cumulative. The final can count as a dropped grade (in other words, you do not have to take the final if you do well enough on the first three exams). If your final is the lowest grade, that will be the dropped exam (in other words, there is no penalty in taking the final).

After the final exam grades are posted, there are no more opportunities for extra credit. I will add any bonus points you had from whatever exam is dropped, but once the grades are posted, the letter grade you see is final. If you see an error in the calculation, please let me know as soon as possible, but do not email me for a "grade bump". There will be numerous chances for extra credit, so please take advantage throughout the semester and do not wait until the last minute!

If you have accommodated testing, please let me know within the first two weeks of class. All of the accommodated testing will be done by one of the TAs in Cate One. About a week before the exam, I will send a sign-up sheet for accommodation and makeup testing with the times and locations for you to choose from.

Bonus Points:

Attendance for this class is not required, but *it is highly recommended!* After every class, I will give everyone a chance to get a bonus points for attendance by rolling a die. If the die is above 15, you get 1 point. If I roll 20, you get 2 points. All of these points will be added to your next test grades. If you are not in class, there is no chance to make up missing attendance points. *If* you are unable to get the point during class, you must see me at the end of that class. That is the only way for me to verify you were in class (emails sent after class will NOT receive any credit).

The only other opportunity for bonus points comes from extra-credit events. Throughout the semester, there will be many opportunities for you to gain 5 bonus points for your next exam if you attend the event, fill out the extra credit <u>form here Download form here</u>(including signatures), and submit it to Canvas before the due date. You are allowed to do 1 event per exam.

Class Policy:

The material for this class is designed to be worked on in-class, so I highly recommend using a tablet (with writing capabilities) or printing off the slides and bringing them to class (I've posted both the blank slides and the blank slides with side notes under the Files tab on the left).

Computers may also be helpful, but there are numerous graphs/calculations that may make it difficult. Keep in mind, attendance is also the best way to complete the class notes. Slides are incomplete, and I won't post the annotated notes until after the section is done (those annotated notes can be found under the Files tab). The best way to learn and stay engaged with the material is to attend every class and take notes right along with me.

During class, there will also be numerous attempts for you to try the examples yourself or with a partner during our in-class exercises. During this time, I highly recommend discussing with your neighbors to make sure you truly understand how to solve it. This is the only time I encourage talking in my class, and I expect the class to quiet down after I call everyone back. If I have to stop the class because there is too much talking during lecture, I reserve the right to end class early, and you will lose your opportunity for the bonus point dice roll. You will also be responsible for any material that is not covered if class is cancelled for noise.

Review:

Before the exam, we will have an in-class review period (this will be 1-2 class periods depending on the schedule). This is a time for you to ask any questions you might have or for any extra examples you might want. Use the bullet points at the end of each module to build a study guide, and come prepared with questions!

- 2. <u>Seek</u> refuge inside a building. Do not leave one building to seek shelter in another building that you deem safer. If outside, get into the nearest building.
- 3. Go to the building's severe weather refuge location. If you do not know where that is, go to the lowest level possible and seek refuge in an innermost room. Avoid outside doors and windows.
- 4. Get in, Get Down, Cover Up
- 5. Wait for official notice to resume normal activities.

Armed Subject/Campus Intruder

The University of Oklahoma embraces a Run, Hide, Fight strategy for active threats on campus. This strategy is well known, widely accepted, and proven to save lives. To receive emergency campus alerts, be sure to update your contact information and preferences in the account settings section at <u>one.ou.edu</u>.

RUN: Running away from the threat is usually the best option. If it is safe to run, run as far away from the threat as possible. Call 911 when you are in a safe location and let them know from which OU campus you're calling from and location of active threat.

HIDE: If running is not practical, the next best option is to hide. Lock and barricade all doors; turn of all lights; turn down your phone's volume; search for improvised weapons; hide behind solid objects and walls; and hide yourself completely and stay quiet. Remain in place until law enforcement arrives. Be patient and remain hidden.

FIGHT: If you are unable to run or hide, the last best option is to fight. Have one or more improvised weapons with you and be prepared to attack. Attack them when they are least expecting it and hit them where it hurts most: the face (specifically eyes, nose, and ears), the throat, the diaphragm (solar plexus), and the groin.

- 4. *PROCEED* to the emergency assembly area
- 5. ONCE safely outside, NOTIFY first responders of anyone that may still be inside building due to mobility issues.
- 6. *WAIT* for official notice before attempting to re-enter the building.
