Meet the Newest Addition to the RELS Faculty

The Department of Religious Studies is excited to welcome James Hill to our faculty this fall. Hill is finishing his Ph.D. at Northwestern University and is scheduled to defend his dissertation, titled "Transgressive Witness: Religion, Race Governance and the Michael Jackson Cacophony."

He is the author of several published and forthcoming articles and essays dealing with such topics as hip hop theopoetics, kneeling and Black athletic protest, Black politics and religion and religion in HBO's Watchmen.

Hill will design and offer new courses inspired by his own research and interests, and he will utilize his own expertise and approaches to courses that make up the core religious studies curriculum. ## RELS Alumni Spotlight: Paige Hoster Good

Paige Hoster Good (RELS Spring 2009) is a trial attorney who represents employers in all phases of labor and employment law. She is a frequent speaker on issues affecting the workplace and has been a contributing author to numerous business and professional publications, including, The Oklahoman and Oklahoma Employment Law Letter among others. Good's achievements have earned her inclusion in The Best Lawyers in America: Ones to Watch and Oklahoma Super Lawyers' list of "Oklahoma Rising Stars."

Good explains how RELS contributed to her success: "The coursework in RELS translated quite perfectly to the work of an attorney. RELS required me to listen, read, analyze, spot issues, ask questions and articulate my analysis and reasoning—whether in a written product or during in-person class discussions and presentations. This is, frankly, the work of a litigation attorney. Most importantly, RELS taught me how to think. How to develop an inquisitive mind. How to continually ask questions, even if the answers are unknown, because the questions in themselves are important. These are skills that can take you anywhere in life, regardless of a specific career path."

## RELS Student Spotlight: Cole Cloyd

Cole Cloyd (*RELS December* 2020) will be pursuing a master of theological studies degree in religion, politics and ethics at Harvard Divinity School, with particular focus on religious and political violence of extremist/hate groups.

Cole explains how RELS contributed to his success:
"I think the OU RELS department helped me in that we have a fantastic method of engaging with ideas and information at both a personal and systemic level. I think we

have some of the best faculty and staff across both the university and the country at consistently challenging students to look inward at our own religious and cultural identities, and outward towards the larger systems and communities that religion plays a factor in. As a department, there is a continuous effort to grow as a scholar (and I would think as a person) from the faculty, staff and the students themselves. There is no doubt without the RELS department, without the encouragement

## Faculty Updates

#### RELS Departmental Faculty

Associate Professor Rangar Cline served as acting chair of the Department of Religious Studies from October until May this past year. He had two book chapters published: "Water and Proof in Early Christian Pilgrimage Narratives" and "Valentinian III's Novel 23." He continued his work on a pilgrimage souvenir database and with GIS maps for his next book project and presented some of that research in progress at international conferences. In addition, his first book, Ancient Angels, was re-issued in paperback by Brill.



Associate Professor Geoffrey Goble had two encyclopedia entries on the 8th-century Buddhist monk, Amoghavajra, published this year in Oxford Research Encyclopedias: Religion and Brill's Encyclopedia of Buddhism, respectively. He is currently conducting research on the material dimensions of Buddhist ritual performance in medieval China and the use of psychoactive flora in those rituals. In addition, he is developing a Reacting to the Past role-playing game on religions in medieval China.




Associate Professor Jill Hicks-Keeton continues to serve as Presidential Teaching Fellow in the Honors College. Her book, Who Owns the Bible? is now in production with Cambridge University Press. This year she received three (three!) fellowships from three separate OU entities (the Office of the Vice President for Research, the College of Arts and Sciences and the Humanities Forum) in support of her next book tentatively titled Good Book. She also had multiple articles on women and the Bible published in Religion Dispatches as well as an article on pedagogy and the pandemic in Times Higher Education.



Associate Professor and Academic Chair Deonnie Moodie is working on a new book project on the emergence of religion in business schools in India and the United States. This year, her article "Corporate Hinduism" was published in Religion Compass and her co-edited special issue "Business and Benevolence: A Cross-Disciplinary Intervention" was published in the Journal of Human Values. She was also a media partner for The Revealer, which published three of her articles on Hinduism and public life, and she participated in an online forum on Religious Studies and the Corporate Form.



Associate Professor David Vishanoff submitted the final manuscript of his book, Islamic Legal Theory: A Critical Introduction Based on al-Juwayni's Waraqat fi usul al-fiqh, this year, which is soon to be published by Hackett. The International Institute of Islamic Thought published a book of essays he edited titled Islamic Law and Ethics, which included a chapter of his own. He also had another book chapter "Informative and Performative Theories of Divine Speech in Classical Islamic Legal Theory" published in an edited volume. In addition, he continues his work on the Islamic Psalms of David.



#### Core RELS Faculty

Religious Studies core faculty who teach and research in the area of religion from different disciplinary homes continue to be an integral part of RELS at OU. Some highlights of their work this year related to Religious Studies include the following: **Associate Professor Marie Dallam** was named interim associate dean of the Honors College and her article on art and Mormon polygamy was published in the <u>Material and Visual Culture of Religion Journal</u>. Director of the Schusterman Center for Judaic and Israel Studies, <u>Professor Alan Levenson</u>, had two articles published in <u>Modern</u> <u>Judaism</u>, and <u>Jewish Quarterly Review</u>. Chair of Classics and Letters, <u>Associate Professor Scott</u> <u>Johnson</u>, had three book chapters on <u>Syrian hymnography</u>, <u>apostolic thought</u> and <u>Christian</u> biography, respectively, published and continues to work on the history of the Syriac language. Associate Professor Jane Wickersham in History is working on an article and book on the Catholic church's prosecution of morality crimes in counter-Reformation Rome. Associate Professor Roberta Magnusson, also in History, is finalizing a book manuscript that includes research on the ways the medieval Church supported urban infrastructures. Associate Professor Sam Perry in Sociology recently published an article on the issues of slavery and antisemitism in the English Standard Version of the Bible in the <u>Journal of the American Academy of Religion</u> and continues to speak to national audiences about Christian nationalism. Professor Tom Burns, also in Sociology, co-wrote and published two book chapters with RELS Professor Emeritus Tom Boyd on culture and ecology and environmental ethics.

Associate Professor Jill Hicks-Keeton will serve as an *OU Arts and Humanities Forum Public Fellow* in the coming academic year. She was also awarded a *Social Sciences, Humanities and Arts Seed Grant* from the Office of the Vice President for Research, and a *Senior Faculty Summer Fellowship* from the College of Arts and Sciences. We are all looking forward to her future projects. Congratulations!

### Staff Updates

Lots of things happen behind the scenes to keep an academic program running. This year along with departmental advising, **Lee Green** participated in University College's summer New Student Orientation, to welcome and introduce new students to Religious Studies at the onset of their OU journey. She managed the department transition to complex new financial reporting and HR/Payroll systems while keeping departmental financial processes, an essential element of supporting the academic mission, functioning. She crafted significant documents for the university and the regents in support of an expansion of the curriculum, a year in the making, to streamline completion of the degree.
