
Welcome Back, RELS!



Faculty Updates

RELS Departmental Faculty

Associate Professor Rangar Cline presented his research on Roman and Byzantine pilgrimage souvenirs at the Annual Meetings of the American Society of Overseas Research and the Society of Biblical Literature. He also joined the staff of the Huqoq Excavation Project, which has spent several years excavating a late Roman synagogue in Israel. In summer 2022, Cline supervised the excavation of an area of the synagogue where excavators found mosaics depicting the stories Jael and Sisera as well as Deborah and Barak.

Associate Professor Geoffrey Goble is completing a Reacting to the Past course gamebook in collaboration with Erik J. Hammerstrom, Ph.D., of Pacific Lutheran College. The game reenacts religious debate in the ninth-century Chinese court, allowing students to imaginatively play the role of a Daoist priest, Buddhist monk, Confucian official, or Chinese courtier. He is also preparing a major research project concerning the botanical species datura in Asia and Asian religious cultures.

Associate Professor Jill Hicks-Keeton served as a Presidential Teaching Fellow in the Honors College. She published articles in <u>Religion & Politics</u>, <u>The Revealer</u>, <u>Religion Dispatches</u>, <u>Times Higher Ed</u>, <u>Ancient Jew Review</u>, and <u>The Journal for Interdisciplinary Biblical Studies</u>. Hicks-Keeton spoke as the plenary lunch speaker for the <u>26th Annual Conference of the Western Jewish Studies Association</u>. She also developed new courses for the department, including Famous Bibles and Women and the Bible.

Assistant Professor James Howard Hill Jr. successfully completed and defended his dissertation, "Religion, (Anti-)Blackness, and Michael Jackson," for Northwestern University. He developed new courses for the department, including Religion and Black Popular Music, Religion and Social Change and Religion and Black Political Thought. Hill also just became a <u>fellow for the Crossroads Project</u> at Princeton University's Center for the Study of Religion for 2022-23.

Associate Professor and Academic Chair Deonnie Moodie's co-edited Roundtable "Living Neoliberalism Outside the West" was published in the Journal of the American Academy of Religion this year along with her solo-authored article, "Retail Religion: Hinduism for a Neoliberal Age." In addition, her book chapter, "Kali and the Queen: Religion and the Production of Calcutta's Pasts and Presents," appeared in the Routledge edited volume, Spaces of Religion in Urban South Asia.

Associate Professor David Vishanoff took advantage of the resumption of inperson conferences to present eight papers in Germany, Switzerland, and the UK. He also launched a new Introduction to Islam course, and continued to work on his translation of the Islamic Psalms, publishing several excerpts from them in The Bloomsbury Reader in Christian-Muslim Relations as well as an article on "Images of David in Several Muslim Rewritings of the Psalms" in a book on The Character of David in Judaism, Christianity and Islam. His book on Islamic Legal Theory was published. He developed the new course Hermeneutics: Approaches to Interpreting the Bible and the Qur'an for the department.













Core RELS Faculty

Religious Studies core faculty who teach and research in the area of religion from different disciplinary homes continue to be an integral part of the Department of Religious Studies at OU. Here are some highlights of their work over the past year:

Director of the Schusterman Center for Judaic and Israel Studies, Schusterman/Josey Chair of Judaic History, and Professor Alan

Levenson's <u>Maurice Samuel: Life and Letters of a Secular Jewish Contrarian</u> (University of Alabama Press) appeared this summer. He spoke about this work at the <u>World Congress of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem</u> in August. This past year, he expended much effort in directing the <u>Schusterman Center for Judaic and Israel Studies</u> and organizing the <u>Western Jewish Studies Association annual conference</u> (March 2022).



Faculty Recognition

The Department of Religious Studies faculty celebrated a number of achievements this past year.

The <u>Crossroads Project at Princeton University's Center for the Study of Religion</u> named **Assistant Professor James Howard Hill Jr.** a <u>Crossroads Fellow</u>. The Crossroads Project "responds to challenges that call for deeper public understanding of and scholarly engagement with Black religious histories and cultures."

Associate Professor Jill Hicks-Keeton received the Dodge Family College of Arts & Sciences Senior Faculty Summer Fellowship, an Ed Cline faculty development grant, and a Faculty Investment Program grant from the Office of the Vice President for Research and Partnerships at OU.

In the spring, **Associate Professor Deonnie Moodie** was awarded a Faculty Investment Program grant from OU's Research Council to pursue research at Harvard Business School for her current book project, *B-School Religion*.

Associate Professor David Vishanoff was awarded the Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences Senior Faculty Summer Fellowship.
