Course Prerequisite: ECE 4613/CS4613 Computer Architecture (or equivalent)

This course will focus on the design of modern, programmable computer systems with an emphasis on exploiting parallelism at the instruction, data, memory, thread and processor levels. The impact this available parallelism (especially multi-core processors) has on software design will also be discussed. The state of the art in computer architecture and its future trends will be examined with case studies of current and proposed microprocessor architectures. Topics will include a detailed look at datapath pipelining/superpipelining, improving memory throughput, instruction-level parallelism, dynamic instruction scheduling, branch prediction, data parallelism, general-purpose computing on graphics processing units, thread-level parallelism, multi-core processors and multiprocessor systems.

Required Textbook: No textbook is required. Regular readings will be posted to Canvas.

Assignments: Regular readings will be posted to Canvas each Tuesday and will be expected to have been read by the following Tuesday. Supplemental readings may also be provided. These may help deepen your understanding of the topic but are not required. Written homework will be assigned most weeks and will be submitted via Canvas. Simulation homework will also be assigned frequently to provide experience using tools and methods on computer architecture research. All assignments will be completed individually unless otherwise stated. A midterm exam will be held during the class period of Thursday March 14, 2024 (subject to modification as needed due to course mechanics). Our final exam will be held in our regular classroom on Friday May 10, 2022 from 10:30AM-12:30PM as prescribed by the University.

Late submission policy: Homework will be assigned on most Tuesdays and due on the following Tuesday. All assignments (homework and simulations) will be given an automatic two-day extension, without penalty) to Thursday. Late homework and simulation submissions will not be accepted after this extended due date. 1. GET OUT: If you believe you can get out of the area WITHOUT encountering the armed individual, move quickly towards the nearest building exit, move away from the building, and call 911. 2. HIDE OUT: If you cannot flee, move to an area that can be locked or barricaded, turn
