To participate, the only commitment is that each student make a good-faith effort to do the reading and come to the group meeting as often as possible. The goal of the program is to offer participants "maximum"


information and enjoyment, without stress which is why the program features no quizzes, no fees and no grades. All books will be provided free of charge.



Moderator: Allison McClung Meeting for: 11 weeks


Set in the early 19th century, this historical fantasy-dark academia fusion follows a Chinese boy named Robin who dreams of being accepted into the Royal Institute of Transalation (called Babel) at Oxford. However, Babel which is the world's leading location for magical "silver-working," involving magically revealing meanings lost in translation, is often used for imperial conquest, and Robin begins to question wheather he should continue to chase his dream or pursue another goal. Babel has secret societies, mystery, and fascinating characters. It simultanously holds your attention through a fascinating plot and asks questions about important social issues such as imperialism, school revolutions, and classism. It is often marketed as a combination of Donna Tartt's The Secret History and Susanna Clarke's Jonathan Strange and Mr. Norell. If you like msterful plot, dark academia settings, and interesting fantasy worlds, join us as we read R.F. Kuang's most recent novel after her wildly successful series, The Poppy War.

Moderator: Allison Byrd Meeting for: 8 weeks


Oliver Marks has just served ten years in jail for a murder he may or may not have committed. On the day he's released, he's greeted by the man who put him in prison. Detective Colborne is retiring but before he does, he wants to know what really happened a decade ago. As one of seven young actors studying Shakespeare at an elite arts college, Oliver and his friends play the same roles onstage and off: hero, villian, tyrant, temptress, ingenue, extra. But when the casting changes, and the secondary characters usurp the stars, the play spills dangerously over into life, and one of them is found dead. The rest face their greatest challenge yet: convincing the police, and themselves, that they are blameless.

In Matt Haig's book "The Humans," the main character (an extraterrestial disguised as Professor Andrew Martin, a leading mathemetician at Crambridge University) comes to Earth on a mission to stop human progress. Along the way Andrew is forced to challenge what he knows about his home planet, a utopian society of immortality and infinite knowledge. Humans were portrayed to him as primitive and repulsive, but as he lives among them and forms bonds he learns that maybe there is more to humanity than he thought. This book makes readers think about humanity and how it is personified. In a perfect blend of psychological concepts, Matt Haig leaves readers contemplating the complexities of being human.



Winner of the 2021 Nobel Prize in Literature, a sweeping, multi-generational saga of displacement, loss, and love, set against the brutal colonization of East Africa.



Moderator: Audrey Fowler Meeting for: 7 weeks



This book is the story of Suki Kim, an American journalist who set foot into the country by posing as an English teacher, who recounts her astonishing experience and paints a very human picture of the country so few are privileged to see. Her memoir follows the routine she led teaching the sons of North Korea's elite families as she expresses each of their personalities and actions much like that of university students anywhere else, yet with a looming backdrop of authoritarianism. The title "Without You There Is No Us" comes from a patriotic hymn sung three times a day, every day by the author's students, expressing their devotion to to remain optimistic in the face of impending doom. the Great leader Kim-Jong-Il at the time. As most of the information known about life inside North Korea comes from defectors outside of the ruling upper class, Kim's memoir ofers a rare look into the lives of the elite in the world's "Hermit Kingdom" and their sons she called "soldiers and slaves."

The family of an Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, became a prime target. Her relatives were shot and poisoned. And it ws just the beginning, as more and more members of the tribe began to die under mysterious circumstances. As the death toll climbed to more than twenty-four, the FBI took up the case. It was one of the organization's first major homicide investigations and the bureau badly bungled the case. In desperation, the young director J.Edgar Hoover, turned to former Texas Ranger named Tom White to unravel the mystery. 



Moderator: Cass Condray Meeting for: 9 weeks



The true root of the problem was segregated, overcrowded housing. This book uses the Tuberculosis crisis to discuss the radicalized history of medicine and the roots of modern health disparities.

Infamous Harry Potter fan fiction My Immortal is widely considered to be a paragon of bad fanfiction writing, being only loosely based on the source material and including a variety of stereotypes and cliche plot devices. Still what literary conclusions can be drawn from such work? In this reading group, we plan to study My Immortal, drawing upon outside sources to situate it within the broader context of fanfiction as a whole. We plan to discuss the cultural phenomenom that is fanfiction, and analyze general thematic content of what makes literature worthy of study. What a work means to fans, how a novel serves its community, and the variety of individual perspectives on any given work provide a nuanced discussion of how My Immortal interprets its source material.
